On Holy Thursday, we held our annual sunrise Passion Play at 6:45 am; a great way to begin the most important four days of the Catholic Church and to share it with family. Our seniors truly elevated themselves as the spiritual leaders on our campus.

We invite the grandparents of our juniors and seniors to celebrate Mass on April 24 at 1:20 p.m. in the Rebel Dome. Please have your children call to personally invite their loved ones.

April brings us prom activities as they relate to Teurlings Catholic. The following is our annual plea to parents: When you set no curfew or if you allow your children to rent hotel rooms, sponsor after parties where anyone who can open the ice chest or look over the bar counter can drink, and let them act as though they are consenting adults, you are gambling with your child's life. You are also gambling with the life of your neighbor's or your best friend's child at the same time. When you let your children go to an after party where drinking is condoned, even though you or other parents are present, you are gambling with your child's life, and with the lives of other children.

Teurlings Catholic does not sponsor, condone, or advertise any after party or drinking corresponding to any school activity. Parents who permit drinking by underage children are breaking the law. Our children are all underage and the state of Louisiana and the Federal government say they cannot legally consume alcoholic beverages. The school will notify the appropriate law enforcement agency of any planned activity associated with any school activity where alcohol may be present. Students will be breathalized by uniformed security before entry to the prom. As a school, we are not gamblers; we take every precaution to safeguard our students.

## IF YOUR DAUGHTER IS GOING TO PROM OR YOUR SON IS BRINGING A DATE, PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING CAREFULLY:

## My motto: "If you have to question it, don't wear it."

Every dance, every year the same thing happens: girls come with inappropriate dresses and are turned away. Parents get angry and the tears start flowing. This is a Catholic high school dance and the faculty, staff and administration DO NOT want to see the cleavage of 15,16 and 17 year old students they teach. I can't understand why some students and parents don't understand that. A dress cut down to the breastbone is unacceptable, as is a dress cut across the top that is obviously too small. Actually, to be quite honest, it is very embarrassing to have a young lady come to the door with a top that is not appropriate. So I am letting parents know now that if a dress is not moderately cut, the student will not be let in. Plunging necklines or deep " V " cuts in the front of a dress have no place at a Catholic high school dance. If a dress is lower than the waist in the back or shorter than four inches from the knee, the girl will not be allowed in the dance. We do allow strapless dresses as long as the top is high enough to cover appropriately. It is my hope that all parents go with their girls to pick out an appropriate dress for prom.

In order to be consistent, it is our decision on what is appropriate, not the opinion of 678 parents. Please call me with any questions or concerns. If you are not

## $\mathbf{1 0 0 \%}$ sure about the dress, bring a cover up to the dance just in case.

If a boy invites a girl from another school, it is his responsibility to relay this information to the girl. Our dress code is in the parent/ student handbook. Please make sure you monitor what your child buys and wears to the dance.

## PROM DRESS CODE

If you haven't picked out your daughter's dress for prom yet, please keep in mind the following guidelines (also found on page 54 of the handbook):

- Spaghetti or strapless dresses are allowed, as long as the dress is not low cut.
- If any cleavage is showing, the girl will not be allowed in.
- Slits on a long dress must be no higher than the knee.
- The back of the dress cannot be lower than the waist.
***Admittance to the dance, with consideration of attire, will be left to the discretion of the faculty/administration sponsors who are present that evening. If a student is in doubt as to the expected modesty of his or her chosen attire, he or she should consult with administration before the dance to avoid the embarrassment of being turned away.

## Cheating

I have addressed this issue in my column in previous years, but I felt, with finals around the corner, that I needed to visit it again. Before you jump to conclusions, I don't think cheating is any worse than it has ever been and not every student cheats, but some do cheat, and the consequences when one is caught can be devastating.

National research indicates that an overwhelming majority of high school and college students admit to having cheated on tests and assignments. We do our best here to make sure students do not have the opportunity to cheat, but there is always someone who attempts to beat the system and gets caught.

The students who get caught cite a number of reasons: "I forgot to study and panicked," and "But my friend needed help," and "My parents expect me to get good grades and I am struggling in this subject." Whatever the reason, the consequences are concrete - a first offense merits a Saturday school detention and a grade of " 0 " on the test. A second offense results in an out of school suspension and a grade of " 0 " on the test. A third offense results in the student's dismissal from TCH.

While it is hard enough to pull up a " 0 " on a regular test or quiz, getting a " 0 " on a final exam often brings the course grade down to an "F." Please, talk to your child about the consequences of cheating. It is not only academically wrong, but also does not fit with our Catholic morality.

## Failure Letters

Failure letters were mailed out before the Easter holidays. This does not mean your child is doomed to fail the class, but rather a notice of the chance of failure. There is a complete quarter of the school year remaining, so most students have ample time, with effort, to pick up the grade. Contact the teacher for suggestions on how your child can improve the grade and prevent a visit to summer school.

Just a reminder that a student who fails a required subject must make up that subject (English, math, science, social studies, theology) in summer school.

## Senior Exams

Seniors will take exams beginning Monday, May 5. The senior exam schedule is:

Students are expected to take the exam during the scheduled hour. Any extenuating circumstances (a brother or sister graduating from college, etc.) must be cleared through my office at least a week prior to the beginning of the exams. We do not move exams for student convenience. All fees, fines, and tuition must be paid prior to the start of the exams.

$\sqrt{ }$ Seniors are reminded to complete the FAFSA online. This is a financial aid application, but most importantly it serves as the TOPS application. I suggest that you complete the form by May so that your TOPS award payment will not be delayed once school starts.
$\checkmark$ All 2008-2009 juniors and seniors are encouraged to prepare for the ACT by using software, preparation books, or by enrolling in a test preparation course. ULL Lafayette, Sylvan Learning Center, and TCH offer prep classes at different times during the school year.

## Graduation 2008

## Seniors and Parents

Graduation will be here before we know it! So that you may begin preparations for the "Big Events," please note the requirements to be met by each student in order to graduate and the dates and times for senior and graduation events.

## Graduation Requirements

All debts to Teurlings Catholic High School, including tuition and fees-for lost textbooks, library fines, and balances with the cafeteria, must be cleared before a senior will be allowed to take his/her exams, which begin on May 5, 2008.
In order to receive a Teurlings Catholic High School diploma, a student must pass a total of 26 units including all state-required courses. A student who fails to qualify under this standard may participate in graduation exercises if, and only if, he/she passed a total of 23 units, including all state-required courses and Theology IV. Such students will not receive a TCH diploma, but a diocesan diploma.
Any senior student who receives a grade of "Incomplete" in Theology IV or fails Theology IV for the year shall not be granted a TCH diploma and shall not participate in graduation ceremonies.
Please refer to the TCH Student-Parent Handbook for clarification of the aforementioned requirements and policies.
Any student who is determined by the sponsors, faculty, or administration to be under the influence of alcohol or any otherwise inappropriate substance during any school-sponsored event will not be allowed to graduate on stage or to participate in any other graduation event. Such students will also be subject to disciplinary action.

## Dates and Times of Events

The Senior Liturgy will be celebrated on Thursday, May 1, 2008, at 8:48 a.m. in the school gymnasium. Family and friends are invited to join the seniors for this celebration. Seniors are to wear Sunday dress attire.
Senior Exams are scheduled for May 5 - May 8, 2008. The schedule for exams will be announced at a later date.
Senior Awards will be held at the Honor's Ceremony, Sunday, May 18, 2008 in the TCH gymnasium. Attendance at this function is by invitation. Dress Code: Girls - Graduation gown, white stole, black sheer stockings, black closed-toe shoes (no slides, must have a back). Boys - Graduation gown, white stole, dark slacks and dark socks (blue, brown, charcoal, or black), dark dress shoes, a white shirt and an appropriate tie. (No graduation cap)
Graduation and Baccalaureate Mass Practice will be held at 9:00 a.m. on Monday, May 19, 2008, at the Heymann Performing Arts Center. Attendance is mandatory for all graduates. Students should be aware that practice will last until rehearsals meet expectations for the final ceremony and, therefore, should not plan any other activities before 12:00 noon. Report cards will be distributed at this time.
Baccalaureate Mass will be held at 5:30 p.m. on Monday, May 19, 2008, at the Frem Boustany Convention Center, which is adjacent to the Heymann Center. Graduating seniors are to report at $4: 45 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. on that day. Attendance at this Mass is mandatory for all graduates. In order to graduate on stage, the student must attend the Baccalaureate Mass. Due the limited seating capacity of the Convention Center, seating for the Baccalaureate Mass will be limited to immediate family of the graduates. Dress Code: Girls - Graduation cap and gown, white stole, black sheer stockings, black closed-toe shoes (no slides, must have a back). Boys -Graduation cap and gown, white stole, dark slacks and dark socks (blue, brown, charcoal, or black), dark dress shoes, a white shirt and an appropriate tie.
The 2008 Graduation Ceremony will be held at the Heymann Performing Arts Center immediately following the Baccalaureate Mass. Guests not present for the Mass will not be admitted into the auditorium until after mass participants have entered, approximately 7:00 p.m. Attendance is, of course, mandatory. Dress Code: Same as Baccalaureate Mass.
Girls will be given a class flower to hold and boys will wear a boutonniere. Beta Club, National Honor Society and Honor Graduates will receive additional accessories during the Convocation. These accessories should be worn Graduation night. No other decorations or flowers are allowed at the ceremony.
Contact Mrs. Norwood in the Development Office to arrange a space for guest wheel chairs.
