From Our Principal...

Wouldn't it be great if all of our Rebel athletic teams never had to practice and could just show up for the games and still win? Wouldn't be great if the cheerleaders, the dancers, the speech team, the music ministry, and the actors in the school play were just born knowing everything they needed to be successful? Teachers, doctors, lawyers, insurance providers, nurses, etc., would all rejoice if they never had to go to college for intensive training to enter the vocation of their dreams. What a world it would be if all of this was true.

The first quarter progress reports have been distributed. Some parents were very satisfied with their child's performance, some not. Many reports went home with "academic probation" stamped in red. The great thing is that these were progress reports, exposing four weeks of academic work for each child, not nine weeks. We have scheduled our annual Parent/ Teacher conference day on October 15, from 2:00 p.m. - 7:00 p.m. Students will not attend classes that day. All teachers will be in their classrooms to meet with parents to discuss the first quarter grades. This is a great opportunity for parents and teachers to communicate with each other and structure a format for success for each and every student. I am sure that many progress report grades will improve and the report card will be a better representation of the student's ability.

Our drug testing program has been in operation since the start of school. It is our hope that the program is a deterrent for student drug use. But that concept needs to be backed up in the home. Our homecoming dance was a tremendous success. Using three breathalysers, no TCH students tested positive. Our sophomores spent four days experiencing the "Crash Course," exposing them to the dangers of drinking and driving. On October 25, all female students will listen to a presentation by 84 year old Catholic philosopher Dr. Alice von Hildebrand titled "Purity and Chastity." All male students will go to St. Genevieve Middle for a video presentation titled "Romance without Regret" by national presenter Jason Evert, also covering the topic of chastity.

An athlete cannot become bigger, faster, or stronger without working hard in the weight room or on the practice field. ACADEMICS

September 17 – to quote President Franklin Roosevelt, "A day that will live in infamy" for some of your students! Receiving that first progress report of the year is a jolt back to reality for many of our students, especially those who came in and "coasted" through the first four weeks of school, continuing the summer vacation by blowing off the homework assignments and tests.

I am here today to reassure many of you, especially first-time freshman parents; there is life after progress reports. Many of the students, when faced with the reality of an F, a D, or even a B or C, learn quickly what is needed to pull the grade up. Here are some things to keep in mind:

- ♦ Progress reports are just that progress reports. By the time the reports are issued, many students have already begun the process of turning the grade around. Progress report grades do not stay on any permanent record and are replaced by the official, permanent, first quarter grades as of October 15.
- ♦ The vast majority of students who got a D or an F on a progress report had one of two teacher comments noted, either "needs to complete assignments" or "needs to better prepare for tests." Those are generally simple problems to fix by doing homework and/or studying for those major tests. There is a homework component built into just about every teacher's grade − and, yes, you will lower the grade an average of an entire letter grade by not doing homework. The reverse is also true − you will generally raise the grade an entire letter grade by doing all the homework.
- ♦ Especially in the first quarter, students have plenty of time after the first progress report is issued to pull up the grades. Consider this − a teacher cannot give a test until enough material has been covered to effectively test the student, so

there are usually more grades recorded during the second half of the first quarter than the first three to four weeks of school. That can be a big help to a student who is trying to pull up a grade. The first low grade on a summer reading test, for instance, means much less by the end of the quarter when there are six major grades recorded in English than it did at progress report time when there were two major grades.

- ♦ For freshmen, it often takes a few weeks for students to adjust to the high school routine. Your child is NORMAL! Now that the first day of reckoning has come, that freedom may be adjusted by you, and freshmen quickly learn that there is a trade-off: Do well, and there is more freedom, do poorly and Mama and Daddy will clamp the restrictions back on!
- Finally, if your student is struggling in a class, encourage your child to approach the teacher either after class or before or after school to ask for help. We don't believe in extra points, but all of our teachers are willing to work with students who truly want to do better and who will put in the time and effort to do so. There are tutoring sessions after school, websites that can recommended, and study skills that can be attended to – if a student asks. And, by all means, if your student still needs help, feel free to call the teacher yourself. We like to see our high school students, however, take the first step themselves and shoulder the responsibility, as young adults should do.

Don't forget, the first report card goes out on Monday, October 15. No report cards will be issued to students. Parents must pick up the report cards between 2 p.m. and 7 p.m. that day. All the teachers will be on campus to meet with parents who wish to do so during those hours.

Last May, Mrs. Leslie Bergeron (Computer Literacy teacher) and her son, Drew Bergeron (12th) attended the Louisiana Teen ' Summit on Internet Safety in Baton Rouge hosted by Prevent Child Abuse Louisiana, Communications, the LA Attorney General's Office, and the Louisiana State Police. The purpose of the summit was to join in with the grassroots advocacy assignment of providing Internet Safety education around the state. The Bergeron's contacted several representatives throughout the state to support this ' Amendment and on July 30th, they received notification that the House Bill was signed by Governor Kathleen Blanco, which included the amendment to support the Internet Safety Education Initiative.

Earlier this month, Mrs. Bergeron conducted a unit on ! Internet Safety with her freshmen computer literacy students. They explored the positive and negative aspects of using the internet. Students viewed several public service announcements concerning internet predators, cyber bullying, and privacy issues. Students were also provided with Internet Survival Tips for Teens. CITIZENS FOR EDUCATIONAL CHOICE (CEC)

Citizens for Educational Choice (CEC), formerly CEF, has designed an electronic advocacy tool to help parents of nonpublic school students connect with and influence their state legislators. Parents in our schools should sign up for this tool right away. Please register on the newly created **CEC** website www.louisianacec.org.

This new tool is called Voter Voice and is very easy to use. Once you have registered on the CEC website you will receive Legislative Alerts from CEC's lobbyist, Danny Loar, during the legislative session. The alert will ask you to contact your local legislator, which you will do by clicking on an electronic link.

You will only receive four or five of these action alerts per legislative session. Legislators want to hear from you. The entire process will only take you 5 minutes, and you will be working effectively at limiting the size of your school's tuition increases (by increasing the Required Services funding) and defeating bad bills that would hurt our schools and your children.


