From Our Principal...

The 2005-2006 school year will bring much excitement to the campus of Teurlings Catholic. Founded in 1955, we are celebrating our Golden 50 Year Anniversary. Over three thousand graduates have prepared the foundation that our students follow today. For fifty years, Teurlings Catholic has been a presence in the Lafayette Catholic Community. During that time, we have established a stable and consistent environment in which students are provided a Catholic education and have seen many generations of young people pass through our walkways. These students have been beneficiaries of the opportunities offered by Teurlings Catholic. The spirit and commitment of these students, their parents and grandparents, teachers, religious, and many others before are what make Teurlings Catholic a special place. Since the school's inception in 1955 many things have changed. Certainly teaching styles, technology, some of the physical structures, and even an increased number of students, stand out as major changes.

As many of you may already know, we have been engaged in a capital campaign. We are extremely excited to announce that we have been successful in the inital facet of our Capital Campaign. Monies have been earmarked for capital improvement, and we have met our goal to match the \$750,000 pledge that has been so generously offered to the school. During this school year, construction will begin to build ten new classrooms and to renovate classrooms 20-25.

In order to facilitate a singular focus to future capital improvements on our campus, we are pleased to announce the appointment of Angela Delhomme as Capital Campaign Director. Mrs. Delhomme was Chief Financial Officer and Chief Economic Strategist for The Strategic Planning Group from 2001-2004 and served on the board of The Louisiana Jobs Economic Development Summit. From 1995-2001, she was a Financial Consultant and Manager for New York Life. In 2004, she was named International Who's Who of Entrepreneurs and received The National Leadership Award in Washington, D.C. She received her B.S. degree in Mass Communications from McNeese State University and her Master's in Organizational Communication and Development from the University of Louisiana at Lafayette where she was named as Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges. While at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette, she also served as an instructor in the Department of Communications. Angela is married to Jeff Delhomme of Breaux Bridge and has three children attending St. Genevieve School.

Four important dates are on the calendar for the month of September. On Thursday, September 15, following a prayer service, the Fall Academic awards will be distributed to qualifying students. Progress reports will be sent home on Friday, September 16, but some students might hold those until after the weekend has passed. (Can you guess why?) On Wednesday, September 28, at 6:00 p.m. in the Rebel Dome, the guidance department is sponsoring a meeting for all senior parents to discuss scholarship and TOPS opportunities. On Thursday, September 29 we will hold our Homecoming Liturgy with a pep rally and bonfire that night. The Rebels host the Hornets of Franklin on Friday, September 30, and the 2005 queen will be crowned at halftime. The homecoming dance will be held in the Rebel Dome on Saturday, October 1.

TIPS FOR FRESHMEN PARENTS!

Welcome to all of our new freshmen parents! If you have had a child attend TCH previously, welcome back! When a student enters high school, it can be just as scary for the parents as it is for the student. I put together some tips to help you through the first few months, and hopefully help your child have a great start!

- **#1)** Read the School Newsletter. Everything you want to know (and sometimes don't want to know) is in the monthly newsletter. It is packed full of information that parents need to know. You can find out when grades come out, what time dances end, who to contact for assistance. In addition, you receive an updated monthly calendar.
- **#2) Get your Child Involved.** If your child has too much free time on his or her hands, this could lead to trouble. Don't be afraid about your student balancing school work, sports, and clubs. Clubs and sports teach them to be more responsible and organized. Going home and watching TV every day teaches them to be lazy. Your students will only get out of high school what he or she puts into it! Check out our school handbook for the many extra curricular offerings and we do have a lot of them!
- **#3) Friends.** Know with whom your child is hanging around and don't be afraid to ask questions. If they ask to spend a night, call the parents and ask about the friend's curfew and restrictions. If your child gives you a story, check it out!
- **#4) Communication.** Nagging or asking a million questions is not communication. LISTEN. Let your child tell you about his or her day on their own. Let them know that you are interested in what they have to say, even if it isn't juicy gossip. You will find that they will enjoy sharing things with you more.
- **#5) Set Expectations**. Talk to your child about the pressures of sex, drugs and alcohol. Let's face it; it's everywhere. Most students feel that their parents have no clue about what goes on and some may be right. Keep educated about popular drugs and what goes on today, and talk to your child about these issues. Tell them often about your expectations. Don't just assume they know.
- **#6) Go with your Gut!** If you notice any major changes in grades, grooming, hygiene or attitude, don't brush it off as normal teen problems. If the change is big enough to notice, recognize it and get some help from the school. If progress reports or report cards seem too good to be true, call the school and double check. Don't ignore anything that you find suspicious. Usually, your first instinct is right, because you know your child better than anyone else.
- **#7) Valuables or \$.** Do not allow your child to bring valuable items or large amounts of money to school. We do have occasional theft, especially in the locker rooms. All students have a locker with a lock, and can keep equipment, valuables, jewelry and money locked up during lunch and P.E. classes. Thieves can only steal what is lying around, so part of the responsibility is on the student. Better safe than sorry!
- **#8) Uniform.** Check your child's hair and uniform to make sure they are following the dress code. If in violation, they will get written up for detention or even Saturday school.
- **#9) Parental Involvement.** Join us for our school Mass on Thursday mornings, attend athletic events and special functions, or join a parent group. Even though your child may act like he/she doesn't want you here, it means a lot to see you around!
- **#10) Bullying**. If your child is coming home from school or practice upset because of teasing or bullying, please let us know. The only way we can handle the situation is if we know about it. Please call me at Ext. 102 and we will try to solve the problem in a way that is best for your child. We do not tolerate bullying or harassment on our campus.

ACADEMICS

New teachers, new books, new classes, new friends...did you ever stop to consider that the only place where you can literally start fresh once a year is school? Yes, I know each January brings a new year and we think about resolutions and fresh starts, but on a practical level, it is only our children in school who truly do start

over each year. How wonderful it would be if we could all forget about what happened last year and start fresh every autumn!

During orientation, when I spoke to our classes, I tried to emphasize just that idea of a new start. Our ninth graders are moving from their lives on a middle school or elementary school campus to high school with all the new opportunities and responsibilities that move brings. I reminded our 10th, 11th and 12th graders that they can look at a new school year either pessimistically or optimistically – that 11th grader, for instance, either has 50% of his/her high school career left or has 50% gone. I hope our students take the

positive attitude. With 75%, 50%, or even 25% of high school left, there is time to repair the damaged grade point average, prep for better ACT scores, qualify for a TOPS award, try a new sport or extracurricular activity, expand one's circle of friends. Isn't that the way you'd prefer for your own student to think?

Encourage your student to explore new options and to strive for success this school year, and not to dwell on the mistakes of the previous school year. It is amazing how your children, even those worldly 17-18 year-olds, listen to you than you think. They listen, they imitate your behavior patterns, and they value your approval. To paraphrase the line from Field of Dreams, "talk to them and they will listen."

Computers and Grants

There was some confusion last spring concerning our participation in a state-funded technology grant, the "Write Well, Score High" program. The state has mandated that state-approved schools reach a 1 computer to every 5 students ratio by the end of next school year. We all know how expensive computer equipment is, especially when technology is evolving and changing as it does. To help the school reach that state goal, TCH has dedicated the funds raised from the Annual Appeal and RABC Silent Auction toward technology acquisition for several years. Those funds have greatly added to the number of computers on campus, provided for wiring of classrooms and new equipment for the business labs, and this year provided for new servers for our school network. However, we still were a long way from meeting the mandated 1:5 ratio. An option we explored was state-funded technology grants, giving birth to our "Write Well, Score High" program that involved timed writing in English classes with the goal of helping students improve scores on the timed writing portion of the ACT Test. This

year the program has been expanded to include social studies classes, and we are receiving 65 laptop computers, carts, printers, video projectors, and software from the state through the Diocese of Lafayette to implement the continuation of our program.

We, as a faculty and administration, chose to participate in this program. Yes, our students will have to write and complete projects in classes using the computers provided by the state. Yes, we realize that none of those computers can EVER be used in Theology classes or for any religious topic. We use other funds generated by the Annual Appeal and Silent Auction to purchase computers that can be used to explore religious topics.

Our survey and assessment program proves that our students are not only increasing their ability to write coherently (and quickly), but their

confidence in their writing has also grown by leaps and bounds. And, that is the real goal of the project. The computers are just the "gravy added to the meat."






Immunizations




